

Four Galveston Housing Projects violate desegregation efforts....

13 Texas Cities Accused of Racial Discrimination

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—The National Urban League Thursday accused thirteen Texas cities of practicing racial discrimination.

The Texas cities were named in a list of more than 140 cities in 24 states the league charged with violating the civil rights law. The group ended its 54th annual convention in Louisville Thursday.

Dallas was the Texas leader in "violations," according to the report. The list was sent to President Johnson with an accompanying letter two weeks ago, but not made public until Thursday.

It charged that Dallas had 10 public housing facilities that were segregated in violation of Section VI of the civil rights law.

Corpus Christi was second in Texas with eight alleged segregated public housing facilities.

Other cities named were Houston, 6; Fort Worth, Austin and

Waco, 5 each; El Paso, Kingsville, Wichita Falls, Texarkana and Galveston, 4 each, and Beaumont and Brownsville, 3 each.

The league also claimed race discrimination in Houston's Jef-

erson Davis Hospital and the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston because Davis has no Negro interns and Anderson no Negro doctors.

Southern states dominated the list, but there were also accusations against Ohio, Nebraska, Oklahoma, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Michigan and Illinois.
